<u>Dealing with an individual sexting incident – The Role of DSL/Deputy DSL, a step by step</u> guide

- If dealing with a sexting incident regarded as Point 1, these are recommended guidelines for safeguarding leads:
- Speak with the child/ren concerned asap, ideally where possible done by a member of the same sex.
- Why was the imagery shared? Was the young person coerced or put under pressure to produce the imagery?
- Who has shared the imagery? Where has the imagery been shared? Was it shared and received with the knowledge of the pupil in the imagery?
- Are there any adults involved in the sharing of imagery?
- What is the impact on the pupils involved?
- Do the pupils involved have additional vulnerabilities?
- Does the young person understand consent?

- Has the young person taken part in this kind of activity before?
- Has the imagery been shared on social media or anywhere else online? If so, what steps have been taken to contain the spread of the imagery?
- Involve parents/guardians asap, at the end of the day they play the most important role in educating and safeguarding their child.
- Be honest with parents and be prepared for a variety of emotional reactions when you inform them.
- Judge the parents/guardians response. Are you happy they will be taking appropriate action to prevent future incidents?
- No reason not to inform key pastoral staff, in fact they need to know in case the situation escalates.
- Damage limitation of the situation.
